The Arrival of the Messiah (Isaiah 53:1-3)

1 - Two Questions

Who has believed our report?

- Statement of astonishment (few have believed this amazing report)
- Speaking: Believing Israelites (maybe as represented by Isaiah)
- Recipients:
 - o *The people (6:9-10)*
 - o The preachers (spiritual leaders 56:10)

To whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed?

- God's miraculous power to bring about His will
 - o To judge (14:24-27; 48:14)
 - o To shepherd (40:8-11)
 - o To deliver (52:10; 63:10-12; Ex 6:6)
- Has been revealed
 - Through creation
 - Through revelation
- Implied: Believe!

2a – His Origins

For He shall grow up before Him

- Suggests growing a process
- Suggests close relationship with God (the Father)

As a tender plant

• Eze 17:22 Thus says the Lord GOD: "I will take also one of the highest branches of the high cedar and set it out. I will crop off from the topmost of its young twigs a tender one, and will plant it on a high and prominent mountain.

As a root

- Gen 49:9-10 Judah *is* a lion's whelp; From the prey, my son, you have gone up. He bows down, he lies down as a lion; And as a lion, who shall rouse him? The scepter shall not depart from Judah, Nor a lawgiver from between his feet, Until Shiloh comes; And to Him *shall be* the obedience of the people.
- **Isa 11:1** There shall come forth a Rod from the stem of Jesse, And a Branch shall grow out of his roots.
- Isa 11:10 "And in that day there shall be a Root of Jesse, Who shall stand as a banner to the people; For the Gentiles shall seek Him, And His resting place shall be glorious."
- **Isa 37:31** And the remnant who have escaped of the house of Judah Shall again take root downward, And bear fruit upward.
- Rom 15:12 And again, Isaiah says: "There shall be a root of Jesse; And He who shall rise to reign over the Gentiles, In Him the Gentiles shall hope."
- Rev 5:1-7

- Rev 22:16 "I, Jesus, have sent My angel to testify to you these things in the churches. I am the Root and the Offspring of David, the Bright and Morning Star."
- Jer 23:5-6 ⁵ "Behold, the days are coming," says the LORD, "That I will raise to David a Branch of righteousness; A King shall reign and prosper, And execute judgment and righteousness in the earth. ⁶ In His days Judah will be saved, And Israel will dwell safely; Now this is His name by which He will be called: THE LORD OUR RIGHTEOUSNESS. (c.f. Isa 4:2; Zech 6:12)

Out of dry ground

- Spiritually Dry People?
- Economically Poor Circumstances?

"At minimum, this kind of symbolism suggests that this person was not born in a palace of a world empire with all the luxuries that are usually afforded to persons of royalty." Smith, G. *Isaiah 40-66* (p. 445)

2b - His Plainness

He has no form or comeliness

- Nothing special to look at or which would draw your attention
- His outward appearance was unimpressive, plain

There is no beauty that we should desire Him

- Unlike Saul (1 Sam 9:20) or David (1 Sam 16:12)
- Unlike "Christian stardom" or secular celebrity of our day
- God didn't choose physical beauty or stature or status to save us
- God doesn't plan for good looks to be the premise of leadership

3a - His Reception

He is despised and rejected by men

- Rejected by His brothers
- Rejected by His kinsman (John 1:10-11; Mark 6:3)
- Rejected by spiritual & political rulers (John 19:15)
- Rejected by the nations (49:7)

3b - His <u>Troubles</u>

A man of sorrows and acquainted with grief

- One known for sorrows possibly mistreated all of His life
- He was thought to be conceived out of wedlock... (John 8:41)
- His righteous life would have brought scorn

3c - Our Response

And WE hid, as it were, OUR faces from Him;

$\label{eq:heaven} \textit{He was despised, and WE did not esteem Him.}$
